Charlie grew up on his family's small mixed farm in Cheshire. He studied agriculture at the University of Reading before joining a graduate scheme at Eaton Estate with Grosvenor.

Charlie was awarded a Nuffield Scholarship in 2019. Through this, he explored '[The Circular Farm](#)', examining how the circular economy can minimise inputs and maximise outputs in farming systems.

What superpower would you choose?


I was going to say to be able to control the weather, but [Nicola Carr](#) had that, so I'll go a step further and say greenhouse gas removal!

"A lot of society is still dominated by a rational, reductive mindset, but when it comes to living systems and people, this can be very detrimental because we are not machines, nor are ecosystems – they are adaptive, emergent and self-organising."



Leading people: Embracing sustainable practices

Do you need to bring people with you on your regenerative journey but don't know how to explain the concept?

Characteristics of top-performing farms 2024

The top 25% of beef and lamb, cereals and oilseeds, and dairy farmers typically make between £50,000 and £120,000 more than the bottom 50% of farmers.

Can farmers in the bottom 50% reach the level of the top performers? Yes, they can, and it is largely within their control.
