Identifying early signs of tail biting



When these warning signs are spotted during daily checks, early action can help prevent tail biting.

Pigs chewing on other pigs

Daily checks

Chewing other pigs

- Chewed ears
- Mouthing other pigs but not necessarily injuring them
- Biting/fighting other pigs

What to do

- Add additional enrichment
- Spray mark the pig doing the chewing to identify it as one to watch



Agitated or restless pigs

Daily checks

- Restless or agitated
- Noisy pen
- Individual (a possible tail biter) avoided by others/active when others are resting
- Sick pigs often targeted for biting

What to do

- Check for causes, eg
 - Stop draughts
 - Adjust feeders and drinkers
 - Identify health issues
- Identify restless pigs to watch by spray marking



Tails

Daily checks

- Tucked under
- Hanging down or limp
- Bruising
- Guarded when at feeders
- Lesions

What to do

- If guarding, check whether feeders and drinkers:
 - Are working correctly
 - Are adequately spaced and have appropriate flow rates
 - Need to be repositioned or increased in number



Lesions

Daily checks

- Many marked pigs in pen
- Scratches/scrapes
- Signs of fighting
- Crusty ear tips

What to do

- Add additional enrichment
- Remove and treat pigs with lesions



If you spot any of these signs, make sure to act to prevent further issues.

Make sure to regularly record:

- Any changes made to the environment
- What you have observed during daily checks
- Changes you have made if there are signs of tail biting
